
We are looking forward to worshipping together again. But Covid is going to remain a risk for the foreseeable future. Help us to keep everyone safe during Sunday services:

- Wash your hands regularly for at least 20 seconds.

- Use alcohol gel on your hands when you enter the building.
- Stay at least 2m apart from anyone who is not in your own household or bubble. This is why some pews are not in use.

Contact deficit?

'It takes a village to raise a child,' according to a traditional Nigerian proverb. The thought is a rather lovely one, I think. Parenting is, of course, the primary route for children's development, but it's clear that even at their very best, parents need other people too. To a greater or lesser degree, bringing up children is a communal effort.

Naturally, grandparents often figure strongly in this, aunts and uncles too, as well as siblings, friends, neighbours, and more. To the list, I'd also add teachers and other kindly professionals, innumerable volunteers in all kinds of organisations, and those individuals prepared to share their time, enthusiasm, and expertise with interested youngsters.

Looking back across the years, as a child I remember fondly the farmer I accompanied as his sheepdog gave birth, the railwayman who let me help with the signals, the uncle who taught me how to raise plants, the granny whose quiet reading time became my life's inspiration, and the playmates with whom I spent

hours and hours. For my own children.



I delight in what they received from child-minders and teachers, countless genial churchgoers who gave them time and attention, and volunteer coaches who with dedication and affable persistence taught them physical skills that were beyond me. These things are mutual responsibility and shared care that literally makes us as people.

How sad it was then to see reports in the news that the lack

of these influences over the months of lockdown is discernible in children now in the first year of school. It seems that for many youngsters the strangely restricted life of pandemic safety has negatively impacted their language development. As well as the likely consequences of this for children's learning, it also impacts individuals' self-esteem and confidence.

News reports also pointed out that many schools are responding by implementing strategies to overcome these developmental issues. The government has said it appreciates the significance of language development in the early years and that targeted support is being offered to children. According to the opposition this is a 'catch-up' that falls far short of what is needed.

Whatever the politics of the matter, this in my mind is one of the crucial deprivations of the past months. If it really does 'take a village to raise a child' then we all have a part to play in the development of all children. By listening, talking, and sharing with our youngest neighbours, and those who are their direct carers when appropriate opportunities come up – we can help to make good what has been missed. volunteering, or simply interested good neighbourliness, we can encourage the children of our community. That is surely what the Saviour who taught with a child at his side, insisting that welcoming the child was welcoming even God (Mark 9:37), would have us do.





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A READER IN A CARE HOME

During the past grim year, I'm sure I am not the only one to have asked, "Where is God in all this?" Working in a care home, this question has seemed all the more poignant, particularly at the beginning of the Covid 19 crisis, when the disease came back to us with a resident who had been admitted to hospital. Several dear residents were lost to us, due to Covid and/or the isolation we had to impose upon them in their rooms. What with the fear of the unknown, together with the need for strict observance of the use of PPE (personal protective equipment) and heightened vigilance of infection control, the extra shifts required to cover several staff who were off sick (some with Covid), we battened down the hatches and prepared ourselves to ride out the siege. Thankfully, restrictions are being lifted, visitors are being allowed to see their relatives,

all of whom have now been vaccinated. Staffing levels are still low but morale is beginning to change and there seems to be the sniff of hope. Where does a Reader fit into all this? To be honest, at first, work took over my life completely. Having to do 10, 11. 12 shifts in a row left me exhausted. From being privileged to care personally for the dying and comfort the bereaved, my work was stripped down to the basics of care – keep them clean, comfortable, warm and fed. Then things changed. The position of Kitchen Assistant came up. I had already done numerous shifts in the kitchen so I knew the job and thoroughly enjoyed it. When I was offered the role officially, I nearly bit their hands off! Although still working extremely hard and rushing around cleaning as well as preparing drinks trolleys and sending out meal trolleys,

followed by collecting said trolleys and washing everything up, I am much more comfortable. It is again not a job I would have looked for, but I truly believe God had his hand in it, with his ever immaculate timing. Jeremiah 29:11 says, "For I know the plans I have for you; plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future". This is my personal verse and I have relied upon it heavily for several years. I firmly believe God sent me to the care home to work and gave me the opportunities and experiences I

to have time to reconnect with him, through my prayers (I can now stay awake) and also to recommence my duties at Holy Trinity. Drafting my first sermon in a year was an unnerving exercise but I was very happy to be back, preaching and teaching. I am so grateful that we are able to meet each other again in Church (socially distanced, of course!) God Bless, Sarah Dutton

Every Monday morning a group of people gather to make art and craft. Coffee is served and the company is cheerful. Over the years the group has created small individual pieces to take home and larger communal works often representing the community spirit of Trinity.

My name is Alison (Ali) Pitt and I've had the great pleasure of guiding folk through a multitude of art projects ,first through West Cheshire College courses now as a self employed community art teacher. Each season often brings inspiration; Spring brings Easter crafts, in the summer we make art for our gardens ,in the Autumn we often look towards making a communal project and of course Winter is cacophony of Christmas creations.

Although there is usually a main theme ,people can follow it quite loosely. So around the table(or tables in our new socially distanced society) people can paint, sew, bead or collage....whichever they fancy. Monday mornings need to be enjoyable!

We never miss opportunity to decorate the church ...so after a new toilet was built some of the group painted individual canvas's to go on the far too blank, white walls. With a sea theme obviously!

Around the walls of the cafe area are tree paintings. Our 'orchard' is painted in acrylic paint and some of the trees have beads and sequins sewn into the canvas.

As you enter the church, above the main door is a star. This star was painted and decorated by the group as part of a project being held across Blacon (it was supposed to be just over Christmas ,but 2 1/2 years later it's still there...which is great!)

Just inside the foyer is a textile wall hanging made up of little

square pictures. Each square represents an activity and group that takes place in the church. Each member of the art class had their own square(s) and using a combination of sewing , collage and painting created a representation of the activity. It was like being in an art factorysomeone was on a sewing machine making the canvas backing, someone was manning the glue gun, someone else was sweating over the iron, and everyone else frantically sewing and painting...I think it's a fab piece of art.

At Christmas its time to make angels/fairies. To be honest from October onwards we are thinking Christmas decs! I try and design a new fairy each year for us to make but you cannot beat the old fave of pipe cleaner and netting...its only at this time of year that I feel the need to use the word 'ruched' as I demonstrate how to create a fairy skirt.

In more normal, non covid, times we share the space with the "knit and natter" group and people popping in for teas, coffees(and cake obviously!). At 11.45 the place is packed as Sue wheels in the soup, which I'm told is incredibly delicious but sadly the arrival of the soup indicates its time for me to cycle off to my next class!
